
The city of Athens was unparalleled in architecture and beauty, but what was Paul's comment?

Acts 17: 16 NIV

While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he was greatly distressed to see that the city was full of idols.

What was Paul supposed to be doing?

Acts 17: 16 NIV

While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he was greatly distressed to see that the city was full of idols.

Acts 17: 17 NIV

So he reasoned in the synagogue with both Jews and God-fearing Greeks, as well as in the marketplace day by day with those who happened to be there.

Question

What is motivating Paul to share Jesus with everyone?

Acts 17: 18 NIV

A group of Epicurean and Stoic philosophers began to debate with him. Some of them asked, "What is this babbler trying to say?" Others remarked, "He seems to be advocating foreign gods."

Epicureans

Enjoy the pleasures of the flesh because there are no eternal consequences. Death was the end.

Epicureans

Epicurus quote:

"Death does not concern us, because as long as we exist, death is not here. And once it does come, we no longer exist.'

Stoics

The ancient Stoics rejected a permanent afterlife so the afterlife did not play any role at all in their value system or their morality.

Stoics

All Stoics believed that we cease to exist when the fiery matter that makes up our soul (pneuma) dissipates upon our death.

Question

Does knowing the Epicureans and the Stoics were not concerned about the afterlife help explain their reaction?

Acts 17: 18 NIV

They said this because Paul was preaching the good news about Jesus and the resurrection.

Acts 17: 19 NIV

Then they took him and brought him to a meeting of the Areopagus, where they said to him, "May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting?

Meeting of the Areopagus

This is the supreme court of Athens, the same court that had tried and condemned Socrates 400 years earlier.

Meeting of the Areopagus One of the roles of this court was to review philosophies. So when someone new arrived in town with some new philosophy, he had to go before this court for review so this was a review of Paul's new doctrine.


Meeting of the Areopagus


The location where the council or court of justice historically met was in the open air on a hill west of the Acropolis at Athens, on the south-east summit.

Meeting of the Areopagus

Traces of old steps cut in the rock are still seen today. On the flat surface of the summit are signs still visible of a smoothing of the stone for seats.







Acts 17: 20 NIV

You are bringing some strange ideas to our ears, and we would like to know what they mean."

Acts 17: 21 NIV

(All the Athenians and the foreigners who lived there spent their time doing nothing but talking about and listening to the latest ideas.)

Acts 17: 22 NIV

Paul then stood up in the meeting of the Areopagus and said: "People of Athens! I see that in every way you are very religious.

Could we say the same thing about our nation today?



Acts 17: 23a NIV

For as I walked around and looked carefully at your objects of worship, I even found an altar with this inscription: to an unknown god.

Unknown God

600 years before Paul arrived history tells us that there was a terrible plague that was killing many in Athens and they didn't know how to stop it.

So a poet from Crete, by the name of Epimenides, came up with a plan. He got on the Areopagus and released a flock of sheep and the god they would lie down in front of was the god that was upset with them and they would then sacrifice the sheep to that god.

Unknown God

What is Paul saying here?

Acts 17: 23b NIV

you are ignorant of the very thing you worship—and this is what I am going to proclaim to you.

Unknown God

Paul is going to introduce them to the true God which is the one they do not know!

Acts 17: 24 NIV

"The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands.

Acts 17: 25 NIV

And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything. Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else.

Acts 17: 26 NIV

From one man he made all the nations, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands.

Please turn to Romans 1: 20

Romans 1: 20 NIV

"For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities — his eternal power and divine nature have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that people are without excuse."

Acts 17: 28 NIV

For in him we live and move and have our being.' As some of your own poets have said, 'We are his offspring.'

Paul is quoting the Stoic philosopher Aratus! What does this tell us about Paul?

Acts 17: 29 NIV

"Therefore since we are God's offspring, we should not think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stone—an image made by human design and skill.

What point is Paul making?

Acts 17: 29 NIV

"Therefore since we are God's offspring, we should not think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stonean image made by human design and skill.

Acts 17: 30 NIV

In the past God overlooked such ignorance, but now he commands **all people** everywhere to repent.

Acts 17: 31 NIV

For he has set a day when he will judge the world with justice by the man he has appointed. He has given proof of this to everyone by raising him from the dead."

Paul had introduced them to God the Father, now who is he introducing them

Acts 17: 32-33 NIV

When they heard about the resurrection of the dead, some of them sneered, but others said, "We want to hear you again on this subject." At that, Paul left the Council.

Acts 17: 34 NIV


Some of the people became followers of Paul and believed. Among them was Dionysius, a member of the Areopagus, also a woman named Damaris, and a number of others.


What can we learn from the fact that Paul taught about Christ using only nature and a quote from one of their Stoic philosophers?


