Earlier in verse 16 we saw the ear wanting to leave the body because it was jealous of the eye.





Paul is preaching about the two sinful reasons divisions occur causing members of the Body to leave the Church:

- 1. They are jealous of others
- 2. Others are jealous of them or feel they are weak, less important or not useful



and those parts of the body which we consider less honorable, on these we bestow greater honor, and our less presentable parts become much more presentable,

1 Corinthians 12: 24 (NASB)

whereas our more presentable parts have no need of it. But God has so composed the body, giving more abundant honor to that part which lacked,

while the more honorable parts do not require this special care. So God has put the body together such that extra honor and care are given to those parts that have less dignity.





Paul is now going to build the foundation needed for these gifts to be effective!






Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household,

The ancient Greeks had 8 words for love!





Eros (romantic, passionate love) Named after the Greek God of fertility.

Eros is passion, lust and pleasure.



Philia (affectionate love)

This word describes love of a friend. Plato felt that physical attraction was not a necessary part of love, hence the use of the word platonic to mean, "without physical attraction."

Storge (familiar love)

Storge is a natural form of affection experienced between family members.

This protective, kinship-based love is common between parents and their children, and children for their parents.

Storge can also describe a sense of patriotism toward a country or allegiance to the same team.

Mania (obsessive love)

When love turns to obsession, it becomes mania.

Stalking behaviors, co-dependency, extreme jealousy, and violence are all symptoms of Mania.

Ludus (playful love)

The Ancient Greeks thought of ludus as a playful form of love.

It describes the situation of having a crush and acting on it, or the affection between young lovers.

Pragma (enduring love)

Pragma is a love built on commitment, understanding and long-term best interests.

It is a love that has aged, matured and is about making compromises to help the relationship work over time, also showing patience and tolerance.




Philautia (self love)

The Greeks understood that in order to care for others, we must first learn to care for ourselves.

Agape (selfless, sacrificial)

This love is an unmerited, unconditional, selfless, sacrificial love. Agape love is extended to everyone, whether they are family members, distant strangers or enemies. Ágape love is never about self and is always shown by what it


For while we were still helpless, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly.
