
Now Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord

What does the fact that Paul was traveling all the way to Damascus to bring back Christian prisoners to Jerusalem say about his determination?

Since Saul was bringing prisoners back he probably had a large entourage of people going along with him.

in Luke's writings repetition of a name refers to a rebuke or a warning. For example Luke makes reference to "Martha, Martha," "Simon, Simon," or "Jerusalem, Jerusalem," and here, "Saul, Saul," All are a rebuke and/or warning.
